

Satpura Range, an Archeological View

The west side of the Satpura Range, called Trikuta, consisted of the current Damoh, Jabalpur, and Katni districts of the Madhya Pradesh State. Three rivers, Narmada, Ken, and Sone, originated at the foot of a hill in the Trikuta. Hindu (DNA H, J2b, O) lived along the three perennial rainwater rivers from 20,000 BCE to 2,000 BCE.

The axial tilt of Earth's rotation, called the 41,000-year cycle, caused Indian monsoon winds, the green line in the map below, to go east to west for 20,000 years and west to east for another 20,000 years. When the winds blew from west to east, the west side was fertile land, and the east side was wasteland. When the winds blew from east to west, the east side was fertile land and the west side was wasteland. Currently, the winds blow from east to west. The winds reversed direction 4,000 years ago. The Thar desert on the west side of the Aravalli Range mirrored the Trikuta.

Hindus moved in when the Trikuta and Thar turned into fertile lands. They vacated when the fertile lands turned into wastelands. They moved east to follow the winds. They followed the 41,000-year cycle of axial tilt to move from Ethiopia to India.
